
# Our Progress Continues Fr. Michael Gurnick, Administrator St. Malachi Parish

# What in the World is an Oratory?

hen a parish can no longer be viable as a full-service parish due to declining membership, finances, or other reasons, becoming an oratory or mission of another parish can be an option to closing. This is particularly appropriate when the parish in question has historically been an important site of worship and is known for a particular ministry. This certainly fits the description of St. Malachi, which has been a beacon of light for more than 150 years for Irish immigrants, the working poor, homeless and other marginalized people, and those in need of a spiritual home. The oratory or mission retains its identity and ministries – unlike a merger where the oratory loses its identity and closes its doors as a place of worship.

One coordinator of an oratory in Chicago likened the relationship of the oratory to its parish as a marriage – two unique entities unite for the good of the whole while both maintain their uniqueness. As in a marriage, working together is an ongoing process, demanding continual respect, compromise, openness, and conflict resolution.

There is no one instruction manual for how this model should look. So we are actually creating what might become a model for other parishes. Currently we are in the Implementation Phase of our collaboration with St. Pat, as members of each congregation work out the details of how we blend together, hoping to have this completed by the summer. This is no easy task, requiring us to be open to the Spirit's inspiration and to each other.

Our goal: to be one parish with an oratory, two places of vibrant worship and active ministries, united and unique, thriving, and continuing to be a beacon of hope to our members and the people of the Near West Side of Cleveland.

# From the Pews: Meet Jan Durkalski

When Jan found St. Malachi Parish in 1978, she was searching for more than just a place to worship – she was looking for a spiritual home where her young family could flourish. "I was looking for a Catholic parish that would embrace my family with vibrant music and liturgies – and ministries where we could live our Catholic faith by caring for people in need," Jan recalls. In St. Malachi, she found a vibrant community that would shape her faith journey for decades to come.

Over the past 45 years, Jan has served the Parish in many volunteer roles, including choir member, Christian Formation instructor, Eucharistic Minister, Lector, member of Parish Council, and Monday Night Meal cook. As a Eucharistic Minister and Lector, she finds particular spiritual fulfillment. "I am honored to assist our priests as we nourish our fellow parishioners with the Word of God and the body and blood of Christ. That moment when I offer the body and blood of Christ stirs a passion in my heart," she shares.

After retiring from a 35-year teaching career in Cleveland's inner-city schools, Jan stepped into the role of Parish Council President. Today, she helps guide St. Malachi during this time of transition and collaboration with St. Patrick Parish. Jan remains optimistic about the parish's future. "I hope that St. Malachi will continue to grow and thrive," she says. "We are the heart and hands of Christ serving the people of the Near West Side."

Jan's life centers on family and community. Born and raised on Cleveland's Near West Side, she attended Cleveland public schools, then John Carroll and Cleveland State University. She and her husband John share eight children, four in-laws, and three granddaughters. Together, they've participated in the St. Malachi Run for more than 25 years – a commitment that extended to Jan's work as a junior high school running team coach.

Through leadership and service, Jan embodies the spirit of community that has helped make St. Malachi what it is today.


## **Movement Towards Collaboration**

rom the beginning, Divine Renovation, by Fr. James Mallon, has been a part of our collaboration process between St. Malachi and St. Patrick. Fr. Gurnick and Rosie Dolan-Baker first shared this book with the Collaboration Steering Committee (CSC), during our launch in November 2023. From there, the CSC members came together to reflect on the message of "Maintenance to Mission" and have continued to use this phrase as inspiration as we have immersed ourselves into the collaboration process.

Additionally, we knew that this message needed to be shared further and so, as Work Groups were launched during our Explore and Recommend Phase, *Divine Renovation* was also distributed to each member of the work groups to inspire them as well. But this wasn't enough. As we continued thinking about the future of this collaboration, we knew that a parish-wide book study – inviting everyone from both St. Malachi and St. Patrick – could be another stepping stone uniting us together as we make this collaboration a reality.

With our collaboration, we have the opportunity to start anew. This doesn't mean that we scrap everything and start over. But rather, we continue what works and further aids our service to the Near West Side of Cleveland. Furthermore, we can work to streamline other aspects of parish life.

## St. Malachi Parish's La Salle Club The Catalyst that Launched the Growth of Boxing on the Near West Side

t was 1894, The Christian Brothers of the La Salle Order operated St. Malachi School for Boys. To encourage their students to engage in sports and other activities, Brother Salpocious founded the La Salle Literary and Athletic Club at St. Malachi School for Boys, which was located at Pearl St. (W. 25th) and Division. Boxing was one of the sports offered to its students.

Fr. MacHale took a deep interest in the La Salle Club. In 1902, he added rooms to the Club for members from St. Malachi School for Boys as well as students from St. Ignatius College (the future home of St. Ignatius High School). Adding to the gymnasium, which remained the focus of the club, now also reading rooms, a library, as well as singing, lecturing, and debating opportunities. The Club provided the boys a place to study and

the silence needed to be successful students.

The La Salle Club garnered national attention in 1912 when it hosted the St. Patrick's Day parade in Cleveland and featured featherweight boxing champion Johnny Kilbane, who had learned to box at the La Salle Club.

In time, more and more professional training sites for boxing were needed and a host of nearby boxing gyms emerged. Popularity of the sport continued to grow so that in Cleveland in the 1920s it was considered "as a way to climb out of poverty".

Thanks to Brother Salpocious and his desire to offer sports to his students, Cleveland was blessed with a plethora of famous boxers including Tommy Kilbane (no relation to Johnny Kilbane), "Black Jack" McGinty, Johnny Risko, John M. "Jackie" Keough, and James Louis "Jimmy" Bivens!
